Nature Watch by “Miss Daisy” Cyclamen



Just as the summer starts to fade, and autumn begins to make its presence felt, the lovely little flowers of the cyclamen (*hederifolium*) appear in our gardens. These small, hardy plants, with their delicate petals of various shades of pink and white are an absolute delight and often remind me of the colours of sugar almonds. The flowers appear before the leaves, and the leaves are shaped like ivy leaves, hence their name, as *Hedera* is Latin for ivy. The plants grow from round, flattened tubers, but they also spread their seed around the garden, usually by ants. These little plants hate hot, dry weather, so it is in the autumn that they come into their own, under hedges and in shrubberies, and they will bloom until the first winter frosts. It is known that they were here in Britain by 1596 as they are mentioned in Gerard's Herbal of 1597.

There are many myths and legends surrounding the cyclamen, in that in Roman times it was believed that they kept evil away, but in the 16th century it was avoided by pregnant women as it was thought that it could induce childbirth. It has also been used as a love charm, an aphrodisiac or an intoxicant [*how do you use it for those? (asking for a friend) – ed.*]

So just enjoy them whilst you can, for soon they will fade as the weather gets colder, to remain dormant until they surprise us once more with their delicate beauty next autumn.

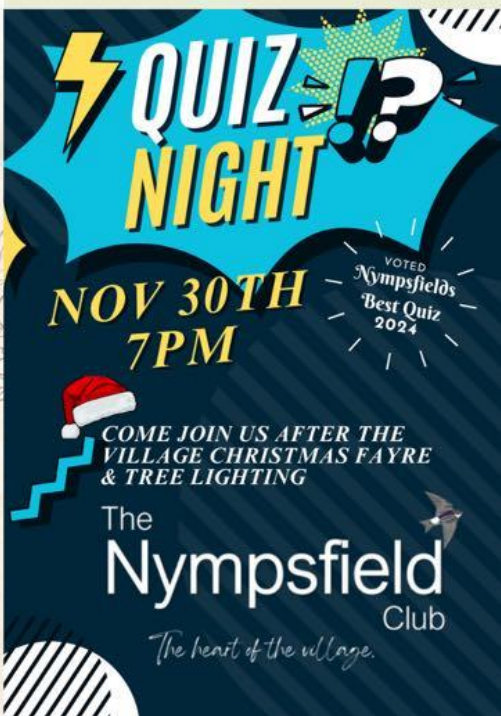
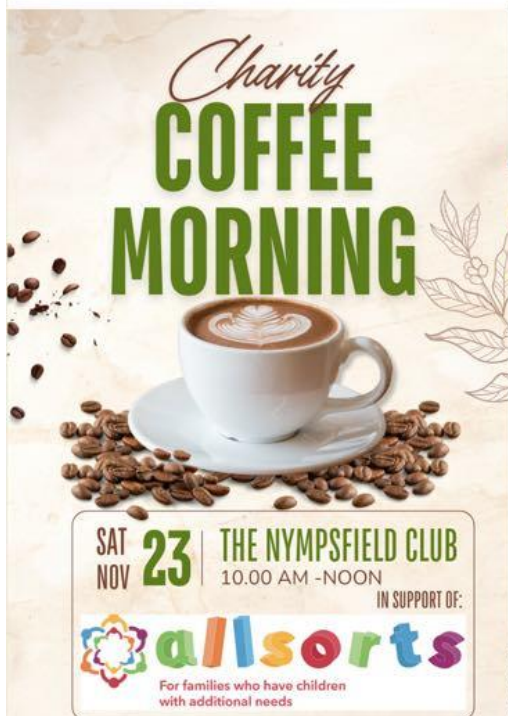

Update from the Nympsfield Community Pub Group: October 2024

It's been a busy few months for our volunteers, but it's been lovely to see the support shown by the community for our Community Share Offer and ongoing fundraising efforts.

Community Share Offer

Since our Community Share Offer opened last month, we have raised

over £120,000 towards the purchase of the Rose & Crown Inn from more than 151 investors (*as of 16 October*).

This is a fantastic start, but we need to ensure that we keep this momentum up in order to reach our goal of £400k. Our Community Share Offer is still open until 6 November, but the sooner we get close to reaching it, the more likely it is that we will be able to unlock further investment, so we urge anyone planning to invest to do so as soon as possible.

If we don't succeed, the current owner has good planning grounds to convert the building into housing, and the pub will be lost forever. If you have already purchased shares, you can add to these by submitting an additional application form and cheque/BACS transfer.

Whether you are able to invest yourself or not, please help spread the word about our Community Share Offer as far as possible! We will be promoting the share offer at Stroud and Nailsworth markets on Saturday 26 October, so please come and say hi if you are there. Our share offer prospectus, business plan and share application form are available on our website. Purchase of the Rose & Crown Inn

As announced at the share offer launch event, we have exclusivity on the purchase of the Rose & Crown Inn until 31 January 2025.

We continue to work with the pub's owner and the prospective purchaser/developer of the stables to agree the boundary between the pub and the stables and associated rights of way. The pub's owner and stables developer intend to relocate the pub's LPG tank to be buried in the pub's front garden and we are investigating the impact of this on the use of the garden.

Grant Applications

We have applied to the Clothworkers Foundation open grants programme, which awards grants towards capital projects including the purchase, construction, renovation or refurbishment of buildings. Clothworkers Foundation can award

grants of up to £150,000 and we should know the outcome of our application within 3 months.

We expect to know whether our application for £1000 funding from Cooperative Bank Customer Donation Fund was successful during the month of October.

The team are also being interviewed on 17 October as part of a £4000 grant with the School for Social Entrepreneurs.

Tails of Boar



A piece on the local BBC news last month showed five wild boar wandering through the streets of Cinderford. These were youngsters, probably a 'bachelor group' of year-old boys, too old to be tied to mother's coat-tails and too young to survive the solitary life of a full-grown male.

Wild boar are (or were) native to the UK. Arthur Rackham, the great chronicler of British woodlands, reckons that the twelve boar ordered to be sent from the Forest of Dean for Henry III's Christmas party in 1260 'were the last free-living wild swine in England'. Domestic pigs are their descendants, bred and inbred by

humans into different breeds over thousands of years –in the same way that all dogs - from Maltese Terriers to Mastiffs - have come from wolves.

Primitive wild boar lived on in the forests of continental Europe but DNA analysis shows that they have interbred with domestic pigs and now have some of their traits: larger and more frequent litters, lighter colour and, sometimes, as shown in the picture, curly tails (your 'true' wild boar has a straight tail with a tuft on the end). Intentionally or accidentally, some of these animals were re-introduced into the Forest of Dean in 1999 and 2004.

The Forest locals are not entirely happy about this. A full-grown male boar can be three feet high at the shoulders and weigh 24 stones; females are smaller but still able to smash wooden fences and push over wire ones. Using their snouts they rip up the ground in search of food and like to wallow in mud; you definitely don't want them on your lawn. If disturbed they will run away but, when cornered or seeking to protect their young,

they will stand their ground. Worse, dogs are their enemy and can be attacked without provocation. In her 2024 book, ‘Groundbreaking’, Chantal Lyons says two people were injured by boar in recent years, both of them dog walkers –a man in the Forest of Dean in 2018 had the pad of a finger bitten off and in 2022 in Argyll (they have wild boar there too) a woman was badly bruised on the thigh when a female boar ran over her. Compared to the number of accidents due to dogs alone, that is very trivial stuff but try telling that to someone who is frightened to walk their pooch.

Government policy is to leave the issue to individual land owners. The Forestry Commission, as the major land owner in the Forest of Dean, treads a delicate line. It tacitly acknowledges the biodiversity benefits of the boars’ rooting and other behavior by allowing them to roam freely; but it also seeks to allay public concerns for safety by keeping numbers (on its own land) at around 400. It shot 771 in 2022-23. This is done at night by forestry rangers; others are killed (perfectly legally) by local farmers on their own land and, inevitably, by poachers. The carcasses are sold on to game merchants and may end up in those tasty wild boar pies and sausages sold in the Stroud Farmers’ Market each Saturday.
